In communities across New York State, the Alliance for Quality Education is winning local victories to improve our schools, advancing a statewide agenda centered around accountability and fair funding, and building a strong movement for educational justice.

This is the first of what will be a quarterly newsletter. It provides snapshots of AQE's grass-roots organizing and advocacy across the state to ensure that all children have access to learning opportunities and a quality education. A New Commissioner, A New Opportunity

On October 1, New York State will have its first new Commissioner of Education in 14 years, David Steiner. AQE is spearheading an effort to put the concerns of parents and community members on Dr. Steiner's agenda and ensure that they have a seat at the table.



Thus far, nearly 100 organizations and leaders have endorsed our "Sound Basic Education Covenant," which contains principles and priorities for Dr. Steiner and a request that he engage parents and community members in providing accountability and input.

On October 1, AQE will hold press conferences in communities across the state, highlighting our local platforms and calling for Dr. Steiner to ensure that the State Education Department is responsive to our concerns.

State Budget Alert

In the coming weeks, Governor Paterson will bring the legislature back for a special session to make mid-year budget cuts to close a \$2.1 billion revenue shortfall. AQE is calling on the governor not to propose cuts to education, and for the legislature to reject education cuts if he does propose them.

Unfortunately, this year's budget doesn't include any of the additional school funding the State was obligated to provide under the Campaign for Fiscal Equity (CFE) court settlement. Instead, the budget "levels" funding for education, which is actually a cut when inflation is taken into account.

To make sure that our kids' schools will be safe from the chopping block we must send a clear message to the governor and our state legislators: "No cuts to education!" [Click HERE to send a letter](#)



Long Island: Victory on Local Reforms



Over 60 people joined AQE at a barbecue to celebrate our victory on local school reforms.

AQE is celebrating the winning of important school reforms in Wyandanch, a Long Island community.

For years, residents have been concerned about the need for transparency throughout the Board of Education. Frustration turned to action when AQE galvanized a committee of parents and community members to develop a platform containing reforms to prevent nepotism and conflicts of interest in district hiring.

In June, the committee presented the policies to the Board of Education, followed by handwritten letters and phone calls from parents, grandparents, students, and community members. The Wyandanch Union Free District adopted “anti-nepotism” and “conflict of interest” policies on September 16th.

New York City: Mayoral Control

AQE played a leading role in the Campaign for Better Schools, a coalition of over 30 parent and community groups, seeking checks and balances, increased transparency and greater public involvement in mayoral control. For more than a year, we helped organize rallies, testified at hearings, held press events, issued fact sheets and reports, and met with legislators.

While we were not successful in efforts to reform the Panel for Educational Policy, we did win a number of important reforms such as the Parent and Student Outreach and Training Center which will provide training, resources, and information to help parents and students make a difference in their schools, independent audits of the DOE programs by the Independent Budget Office and financial audits by the comptroller, as well as requirements for superintendents to focus on districts only.

Buffalo: Preventing School Violence

AQE is spearheading a campaign to help prevent school violence in Buffalo by instituting a district-wide universal dress code for students.

Currently, there are 34 schools with different dress codes in the city, leading to students being targeted based on their uniform color.
