Action in Albany

Parents from New York City and advocates held a press conference on January 20, 2010 opposing the Executive Budget which includes a \$1.4 billion proposed cut to education. The parents delivered hundreds of broken pencils to the governor and legislature to symbolize the State’s broken Campaign for Fiscal Equity promise to New York’s schoolchildren by not delivering any additional CFE funding as the 2007 education reform requires. The proposed cuts are on top of the already broken promise parents and advocates stated.

Over the past month, AQE is been playing a leading role in the struggle for parent and community input around the many school closings, the plan to turn around struggling schools and the co-locations of charter schools within traditional public schools.

On both February 23rd and March 2nd AQE was part of organizing a series of events in NYC with the Coalition for Educational Justice, calling for a moratorium on co-locations and school closings until an independent

analysis on the impact is made. Parents and community are loudly telling the Dept. of Education to “Fix our schools - not close them!” and to stop pitting parents against parents and schools against schools through co-locations.

AQE has been attending numerous hearings, engaging in outreach to affected parents, students and communities, organizing meetings and working together with strong allies like CEJ and NY Communities for Change to make parent and community voice heard in decision-making

Faith Initiative

On January 16, 2010 AQE joined the NYC Coalition for Educational Justice at their “Educational Justice Day in NYC” rally honoring the legacy of Dr. Martin Luther King Jr. The rally was held at the Abyssinian Baptist Church in Harlem, New York. 1400 parents, youth and community joined in a united voice in support of CEJ’s platform to Redesign and Expand the School Day.

At the rally, AQE invited the 1400 people present to break pencils as a symbol of the broken Campaign for Fiscal Equity promise to the children of NY. It was an incredibly powerful moment when everyone stood up and simultaneously broke pencils. A few days later parents with AQE and CEJ took the pencils to Albany where there was a press conference and delivery of the pencils to the Governor’s office.

Syracuse Parents and Advocates Respond to Governor's \$1.4 Billion Cut to Schools On Top of the Broken CFE Promise

The Alliance for Quality Education held press conferences across the state to oppose the Executive budget proposal to cut \$1.4 billion from education. In Syracuse, AQE held our press conference at Edward Smith Elementary school to explain why education funding cannot be cut. If the proposed cuts to education are voted, with the cut to **Syracuse totaling \$11 million, the school system would lose approximately 165 teachers.**

At the press conference, all of our members, including retired teachers, parents, and grandparents expressed their outrage with the cuts. They also explained how the state has repeatedly broken its promise to fully fund public schools so that all students get a sound basic education. The Alliance for Quality Education continues the fight against the proposed budget cuts to education.

Buffalo: Local and State Work

Parents and students alike are starting to see AQE's local campaign for School Safety – Universal Dress Code become a reality. With just over 60 days left until the deadline for submitting a petition, we currently have over 3000 signatures.

Buffalo received an incredible response from the media on their January 2010 press conference opposing proposed cuts to education on top of an already broken promise. This press conference was covered by nearly all the local media outlets and helped gain support from concerned citizens for the issue. Below are links to some of the coverage. Leaders from organizations such as the Buffalo Exchange Club and the Somali Bantu Community Organization spoke and shared their stories of what they stand to lose if education is cut.

Turnaround schools

The federal government is requiring the lowest performing schools to dramatically restructure. These schools have the lowest state test scores and graduation rates under 60%. Each state must identify 5% of its low-performing schools. In New York, there are [57 low-performing schools](#).

The Alliance for Quality Education has been one of the lone and loudest voices for a long time advocating that the lowest performing schools need dramatic action to become successful. Even though we are pleased that action is being taken to make these schools successful, we would like to see the proven educational strategies. We believe that parental and community input and practices based on research are key ingredients in making this happen. We are working hard to make sure that the plan that school districts choose is based on the practices that successful schools use, and that parents' voice is heard.



School districts with a school on the list have four options:

- redesign the school and replace the principal and **all of** the teachers, even though 50% of them can be rehired (as it happened in [Central Falls, RI](#)), even though there is little evidence that such practice works;
- convert the school into a charter, even though charters do not have a track record of turning around low performing schools and have no transparency;
- transform the school so that
 - the principal and the teachers are given professional development,
 - the school day and year is extended;
 - comprehensive instructional reform;
 - close the school..

Each school can receive between \$500,000 and \$2 million per year.

AQE believes quality education is a civil right. All students should have access to excellent schools. Dramatic action is needed to make every school excellent. We are working hard to make sure that the community is engaged in the plan development process. Quality education involves parents and the community as equal partners to make sure that all students succeed to the maximum of their ability.
